

Mr. Ted's Class Gets Wet

A field to trip to the water treatment facility

Class 6B went on a field trip with Mr. Ted on October 26. The reason? Mr. Ted thought it was time they had a field trip and relaxed. It was a hot and sunny Friday afternoon during science class, when the whole class had to run to the water treatment facility from the school campus. By the time they reached the facility they were tired and thirsty from all the running. Most of the class had low expectations, but when they got there, they were amazed. The guide showed the class how the water was filtered, cleaned, and even showed how waste was disposed. "The waste had a very putrid smell though," said Wesley, one of the 6B students.

The filtration is done in several steps. First, some chemicals are used to cause the dirt and waste in the water to clump up. Then, as the dirt and waste slowly sink to the bottom, it is easily separated. They water is then filtered by pouring it through a container filled with pebbles and sand.

They gave the class a tour through

the facility, showing them how the machines worked and what they did.

After the field trip, 6B students walked back to the school. Halfway there, some students started running for fun. They went further than everyone else, so some students thought they were lost. When they got back to the classroom, they found the "missing" students under teacher supervision waiting for them. Even though some students were upset, it was a successful field trip.






Sing in the New Year Christmas Concert Preview




