One Crazy Summer by Rita Williams-Garcia


Length: 215 pages



The cluster of bananas sold in supermarkets is a "hand," while individual bananas are called "fingers."


A man in India once ate 81 bananas in a half an hour.

In Auburn, Washington there is a museum dedicated to bananas called the Washington Banana Museum.


